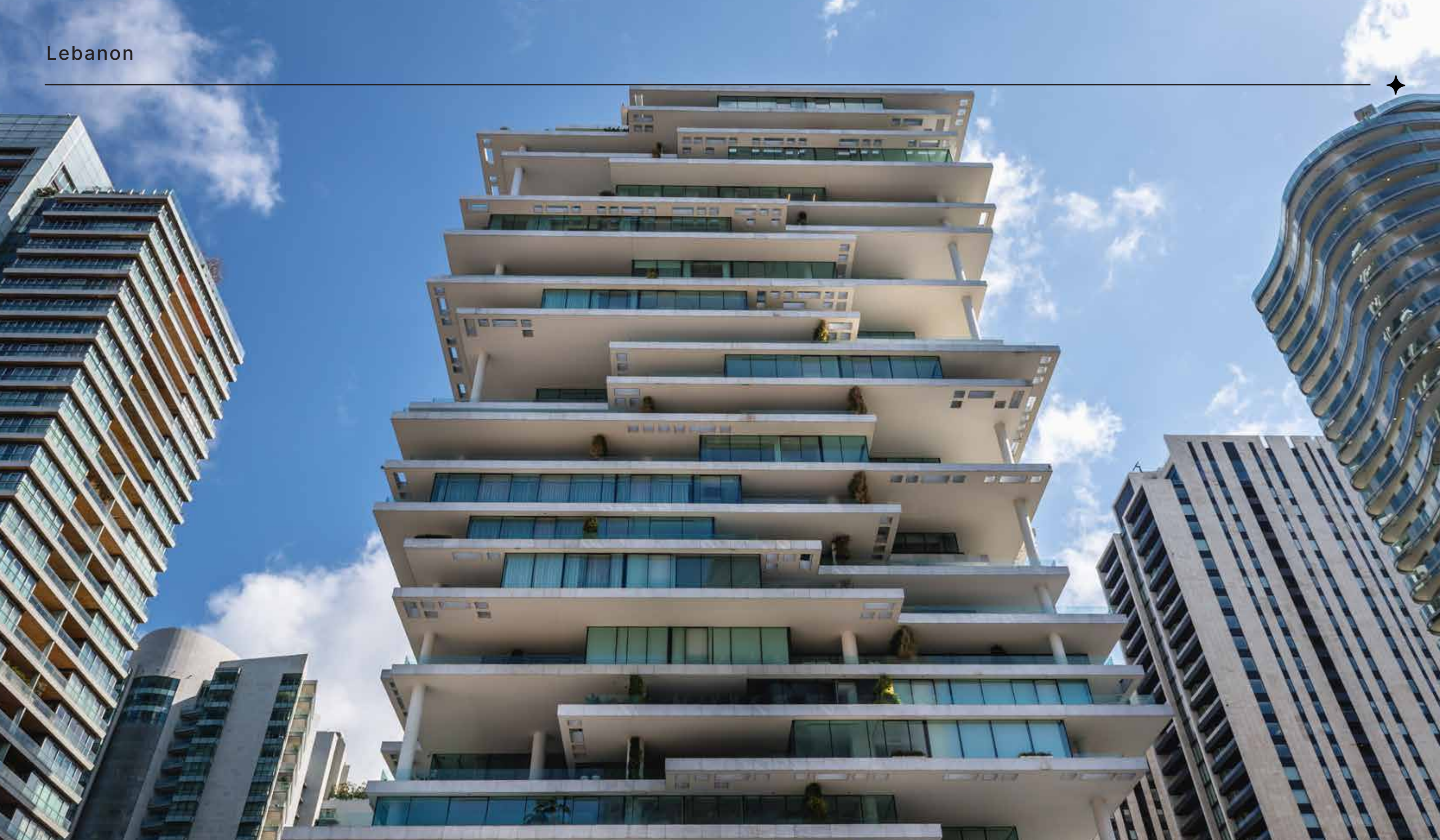

Baalbek

On the stone altars of Baalbek from the earliest times the sun god Baal was worshipped hence the name, and with the rise of the Roman Empire there were giant temples to Jupiter, Bacchus and Venus. Baalbek is famous for them all over the world, and travelers have come to see them. Old World travelers from the middle of the XIX century, wrote about them Flaubert, Bunin, Mark Twain.

The columns of Jupiter's temple are stunning with their scale, three times the height of the Parthenon columns the height of the columns of the Parthenon on the Greek Acropolis.

The mystery of the centuries remains to this day the trilithons, the giant monolithic slabs laid in the base of the temple. How did it ancient people have been able to do?

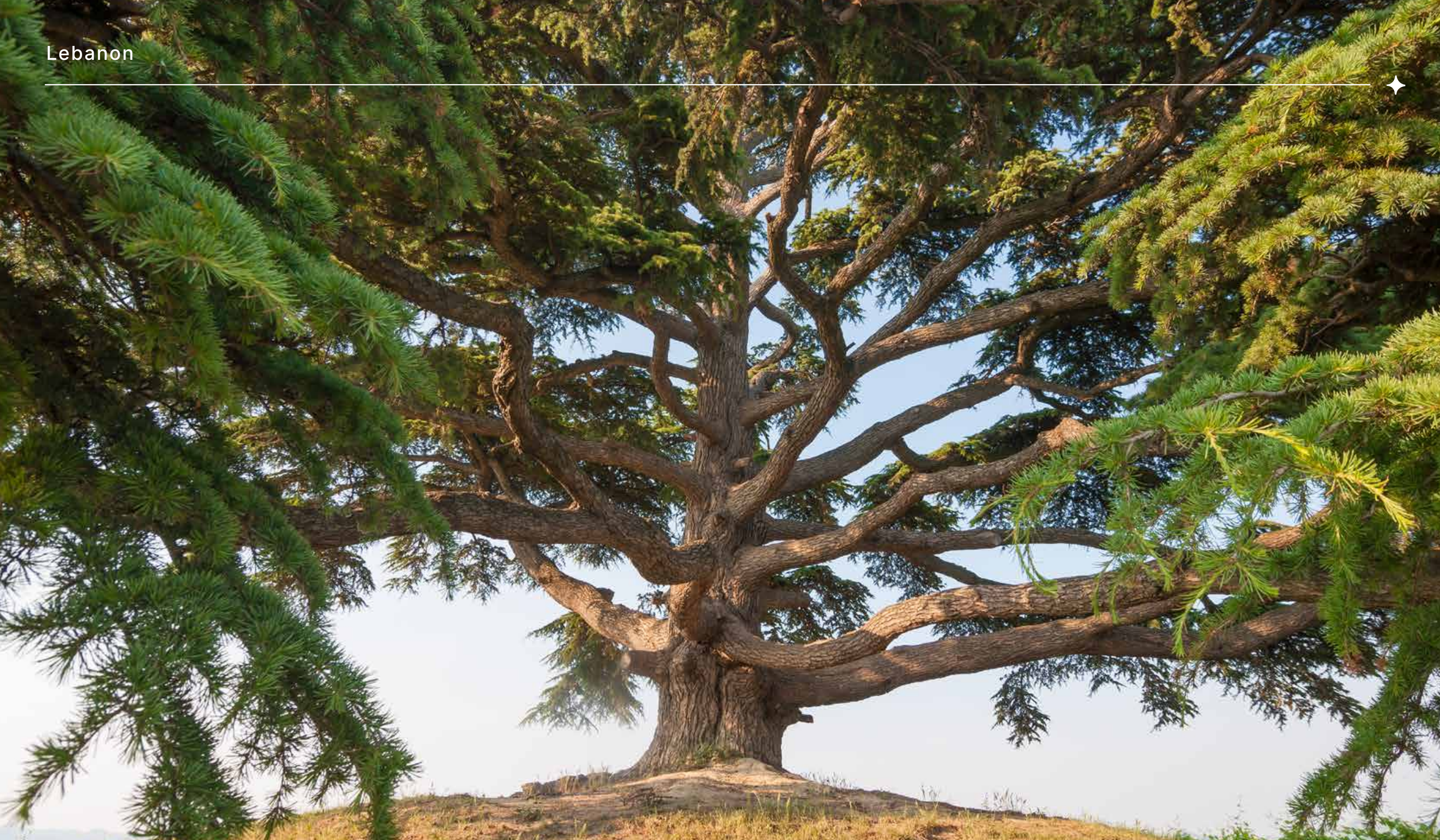


Lebanese cuisine

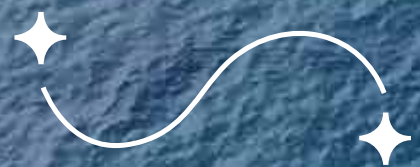
